BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

Gustav Becker, pioneer merchant and businessman, was born in Germany in 1856; he came to the United States in 1871 and worked for his brother, John, at the Huning and Becker Store in Belen, New Mexico. In 1875, Gustav joined his brother, Julius, in Round Valley, Arizona. They established the Becker Brothers store (1876-1893) which supplied goods to military posts, farmers and ranchers. When Julius died in 1893, Gustav renamed the store the Gustav Becker Store (1893-1908); in 1908 the store was incorporated as the Becker Mercantile Company. Gustav married Louisa in 1885; they had nine children: Julius W., Lucie, Walter, Edward, Paul, Alvin, Hugo, Emma, and Arthur.

Gustav was an advocate of highway construction in Arizona. In 1881, he laid out a road from Springerville east to Quemado, New Mexico; in 1887, he developed a road from Springerville to McNary, Arizona. In addition to his business, he served as Notary Public and was U.S. Postmaster for many years. He was a school trustee, and was president of Round Valley Light and Power Company and the Round Valley Bank. He served on the Executive Committee of the Arizona Cattle Growers Association, was a charter member of the Arizona Good Roads Association, and County Engineer for Apache County. He was also president, owner or partner in the Apache Tavern Hotel, Becker Motor Company, Becker-Keogh Hardware Company in El Paso, Texas, Becker-Mactavich Company in Magdalena, N.M., and Becker-Franz Co. in Socorro, N.M. Gustav died in 1940 and a monument was erected to him on the Post Office grounds in Springerville, Arizona.

Gustav's son, Julius W. Becker, was born in Springerville in 1886. He managed the Becker Mercantile Company from 1913 and became president after the death of his father in 1940. In 1935, he and his father were instrumental in securing Works Projects Administration funding to build the White Mountain Hospital. Julius owned the J. Becker Cattle Company, and the Diamond Rock Lodge Resort in the White Mountains. He was appointed to the Arizona Board of Directors for the National Trail Highways in 1932. Julius married Orabelle in 1924 and they had two sons, Robert and Richard. Julius died in 1959. Becker Mercantile was destroyed in a fire in 1964.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

Correspondence, photographs, legal documents, and financial records chiefly documenting the Becker Mercantile Company and other businesses of the Becker family as well as documents relating to the family's interests in the development of Apache County, Arizona.

The correspondence mostly concerns business matters, political favors, the cattle and livestock industry, grazing law, and condolences on Gustav's death. Noted correspondents include Ralph Cameron, Barry Goldwater, Frederick H. Harvey, and Harry S. Truman.

There is also correspondence and legal documents relating to the St. John's and Springerville water litigation over use of the Little Colorado River, correspondence and photographs of the dedication of the Madonna of the Trail monument, and correspondence and financial records about building the White Mountain Hospital.

There are merchant's documents about rationing in World War II, subscription lists to pay nurses during the 1918 flu epidemic, and a Justice of the Peace docket for E.C. Bunch of Springerville for 1879 which also contains school class lists and a Great (voting) register for Apache County, 1879.

Manuscripts by Julius Becker concern a proposal for U.S. Highway 64 and U.S. Highway 270 and a history of Springerville. In addition to daybooks and financial ledgers, Becker Mercantile records include an apothecary record, 1876-1882, an explosives sale record, 1944-1945, and employee efficiency reports, ca. 1940. There are also registers signed by tourists stopping at Becker Garage between 1918 and 1925 which list name, home state, type of automobile, and destination, and a register for Beckers Tourist Court, Springerville's first auto court, 1930-1931.

Photographs are mostly of Gustav and Julius Becker and other family members. A few show Springerville streets and Becker family businesses. There is also one photograph each of Harry Truman and Barry Goldwater.

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
