The diaries document Blake's extensive travels and scientific work throughout the United States and Europe, especially Arizona and the Southwest, including the Pacific railroad expedition of 1853. Contains many pencil and ink sketches. Accompanied by some correspondence, last will and other material.

## **BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE**

William Phipps Blake, geologist, mining engineer and educator, was born in New York in 1826. He graduated from Yale in 1853 with training in geology, chemistry and mineralogy. From 1853-1856, he joined the Williamson Party with the U. S. Army Corps of Topographical Engineers as a mineralogist-geologist to examine a route for the railroad from the Mississippi to the Pacific. From 1856 to 1859, he investigated the mining regions of North Carolina. From 1861-63, he was employed as a mining engineer by the Japanese government in the company of Raphael Pumpelly. He was appointed mineralogist of the California State Board of Agriculture and professor of mineralogy and geology at the College of California in Berkeley (later UC-Berkeley).

In 1867, he was appointed commissioner for California to the Paris Exposition and edited the six volumes of reports of the U. S. Commissioners. He worked as Chief of Scientific Corps of the U. S. to Santo Domingo and then as commissioner of the U. S. to the Vienna Exposition. He worked on numerous mining surveys through Europe and the West (including Arizona, Texas, New Mexico, California, Utah, Nevada and Montana). In 1895, he became professor of geology and mining at the University of Arizona. He was also Arizona Territorial mineralogist and geologist. He died in 1910.

# SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The bulk of the collection consists of 320 diaries documenting Blake's travels and scientific work throughout the United States and Europe. The diaries have each been given a volume number (v. 1-320) and are arranged chronologically. There are also eight folders in box 4 containing business papers, correspondence, notes and printed material and one folder of manuscripts; the folders have been given volume numbers of 321-328.

Blake's diaries are mostly technical and cover the bearings of mines, technical surveys and assay reports. The description of mines often have drawings and technical illustrations. The diaries include detailed observations on mining ventures near Castle Dome, the Ehrenberg-La Paz freighting road, Vulture Mine, Tumacacori and San Xavier Missions, Ajo, Tombstone and Tucson. The diaries also cover Blake's observations and drawings on his travels. Chronologically, the diaries cover travels in the following areas:
