### DESCRIPTION

Handwritten reminiscences entitled "An Indian Scare" about living at Copper Camp on the north side of Mount Lemmon in the Catalina Mountains. Beginning in August 1885, Mrs. Dyer describes Mexican Americans cutting timber for use in Mammoth Mine, mining activities, Eskiminzin and his camp along the San Pedro River, and a May 1886 fight between ranchers and a band of Apaches on the San Pedro leading to the death of Dr. Davis and the Dyers evacuation of Copper Camp. This manuscript was published in the *Arizona Historical Review* in August 1928.
