**BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE:** Courtenay DeKalb, an internationally recognized mining engineer, was born in Loudoun County, Virginia in 1861, and held a variety of professional positions throughout his life. He was a professor of Mining and Metallurgy at the University of Missouri, professor of Mining Engineering at the University of Alabama, and he founded the School of Mines at Queens College in Kingston, Ontario. He managed several mines in California and Mexico, including the Roadside Mine in Tucson which he opened in 1921. He was the associate editor of the Mining and Scientific Press and was President of the Pacific Mining and Smelting Company. In 1913, he married his second wife, Frances Douglas, in Tucson. In 1919, he became a trade commissioner for the U.S. Department of Commerce, where he researched the mineral resources of Spain, Morocco, and Portugal. He was a long-time member of the National Arts Club in New York City, and published literary work, as well as scientific publications. From his first marriage he had two sons, Bozarte and Keith, and two daughters, Eugenie and Beatrice. He died in 1931 before finishing his biography of Charles III of Spain.

Frances Douglas DeKalb, an internationally recognized scholar known mostly for her translation of the Spanish writers Vincente Blasco Ibanez and Concha Espina, was born in East Cornwall, Connecticut in 1870. In 1891, she married Charles Lummis, the first city editor of the Los Angeles Times, but the two divorced in 1911. She promptly moved to Tucson and married Courtenay DeKalb two years later. She was a regular contributor for the *New York Times Book Review* and published works in such newspapers as the *Los Angeles Times*, the *New York Evening Post*, and the *San Francisco Examiner*. In 1933, she received an honorary doctorate of letters from the University of Arizona. In 1934, she received the Madalla de Honor de la Instrucción Publica de Venezuela. From her first marriage, she had two sons, Keith and Jordan (a.k.a. Quimu), and one daughter, Turbesé. Before she moved to California in 1963, she donated her personal library to the Romance Languages Department at the University of Arizona. She died in 1969.

**SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE:** The photographs in this collection are primarily of the “snapshot” variety and include mining, travel and family portraits. The bulk of the mining and travel snapshots are taken in Mexico and Spain, though there are some from Arizona, California, Nevada and other places where DeKalb went for mining work and where Frances and Courtenay traveled. Portrait files are

primarily members of the DeKalb family. For the most part, the quality of the photographs if not very high, though there are some nice early family portraits.

The mining photographs include workers in mines as well as equipment and general views of mining operations. This includes one folder of Mexican Revolution photographs labeled “Maderistas at Fundición,” 1911 (photos by Parlee). The travel snapshots of Arizona include a number of photographs around San Xavier Mission including two folders of pictures around the Tohono O’odham reservation.
