DESCRIPTION

The collection consists of photographs and a scrapbook. The photographs, taken between 1964 and 1968, relate to Muriel Sullivan's work as an Extension Home Economist for the Bureau of Indian Affairs on the Tohono O'odham reservation. The scrapbook of photos, newspaper clippings and information on the Tohono O'odham was created by Muriel Sullivan to describe the work of the Sells Service Women between 1962 and 1983.

BIOGRAPHICAL AND HISTORICAL NOTE

Muriel K. Sullivan was born in Brockton, Massachusetts and was educated in the Boston area. Sullivan worked for the Works Progress Administration in the area of early childhood training after graduating from college. She quickly changed jobs and began to work for Boston Edison where she learned to use the latest equipment in order to train others in cooking classes. As Boston Edison shifted all of its attention to war production during World War II, Sullivan was forced to look for another job. She worked briefly for the Farm Security Administration until the federal government dissolved the budget, at which time she taught sewing, cooking and home management in Boston-area junior high schools and senior high schools.

Diagnosed with pleurisy in the mid-1940s, Sullivan moved to Phoenix to clear her lungs. She worked for the Arizona Edison Company (now named Arizona Public Service) in the Home Services Department for about five years, at which time she married and relocated to Tucson. In 1962, with the help of Elizabeth Estrada, Sullivan established the Sells Service Women with a membership of 27 women. Sullivan became president of the group, a position which she retained until her death. Sullivan was responsible for bringing the University of Arizona's Town and Country Week to the Tohono O'odham reservation. Every year the University would close prior to the start of summer session at which time anyone could participate in the variety of classes offered. Sullivan arranged for two women from each village on the reservation to attend the classes. She hoped that , through this program, the children of these women would be encouraged to attend the University. In 1964, after Sullivan's husband died, she obtained a job with the Bureau of Indian Affairs and moved to Sells. She worked for the BIA from 1964 to 1968 and, as an Extension Home Economist, her job was to do anything worthwhile that upgraded living conditions on the reservation. Muriel Sullivan died on October 26, 1995.

The Sells Hospital Service Women, based in Tucson, Arizona, organized in 1962 (later changing the name to Sells Service Women) in order to aid the Sells Indian Hospital in Sells, Arizona, by hosting arts and crafts activities, by acquiring necessary medical equipment, and by sponsoring the Sells Candy Stripers. The group quickly expanded its work to provide such items as clothes, shoes and playground equipment. Their major fundraising event was their annual card party where they received many donations from local businesses and sold raffle tickets. The Sells Service Women often received help from other volunteer (mostly women's) organizations, either through knitting clothes or through aiding the women's fundraising efforts. In the late 1970s federal funding increased for the hospital, but the Sells Service Women continued its work in new ways by providing small scholarships for Tohono O'odham students attending Pima Community College and by donating books and magazines to libraries on the Reservation.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

There are two parts to this collection. The first part consists of photos recording Sullivan's work for the BIA on the Tohono O'odham reservation from 1964-1968. In this capacity, Muriel Sullivan taught classes in sewing, nutrition, and arts & crafts for the women on the reservation, mostly in Sells, Pisinimo, Gila Bend, San Xavier, Santa Rosa Ranch, Kerwo, Topawa and New Fields. Sullivan labeled many of the photos, indicating the year, the project and sometimes the people. There are photos of the landscape and houses in Gila Bend and New Fields, and there are also several photos relating to the Sells Service Women. Most of the photos are black and white, but there are some color photos, slides and one negative.

The second part of the collection contains a scrapbook of newspaper clippings, photos and programs collected by Sullivan that details the work of the Sells Service Women from 1962-1983. The scrapbook also contains information on the Papago Candy Stripers, the Sells Service Women annual card party, and thank yous for the group's various contributions.
